Three Sweet Sisters

Right before this past Thanksgiving, Love a Golden Rescue got a call from another rescue.

"Can you take three 8-year old females? They're sisters... from a breeder." My mouth agreed to take them, my heart was willing, but my mind wondered. Where were we going to put them, and how much "baggage" did they have?

We picked them up in the Fort Leonard Wood area. One was confident, one was a mixture of shyness and confidence, and one was completely shut down. All three were overweight.

The car ride home was smelly. The girls brought the stink of their kennels along with them. Thankfully, they were all good in the car.

As always, their first stop was the vet. Since they seemed like healthy dogs—just a little heavy—they went to boarding to chill out for a few days. At Westinn, their spa treatment started with baths... and time to get acclimated to life in a clean, loving place.

We named them lvy, Eve and Joy.

The sisters went to foster homes and soon were adopted. This is the story of how these sisters found their forever homes.

Ivy was the most outgoing of the three. I fostered her, and she got along well with my herd. One of our LAGR families had lost their beloved golden and were looking for another older dog. I filled them in on Ivy. Gail and her husband met this beautiful red-head at the vet on the day her spay stitches were removed and fell in love.

An update from Ivy's forever home: Her nickname is Ivy Patch, and she's learning how to be a spoiled pet from her brother, Pokey the Puppy (a terrier mix). "She lies next to me on the bed, so I can read while I pet her and love her." This old girl had no idea how to be on a leash, so they are taking it a little at a time... a mile every day, and they walk in the park like normal families and their pets do. At first, she had to be coaxed to get in the car. Not long ago, Ivy pushed Pokey aside, so she could get in the car first.

"For being such a scaredy-cat when we first got her, in just a couple of weeks, we are seeing her blossom." Ivy's almost caught a couple of squirrels and has even gotten comfortable enough that she stole some food off the

bedside table—when Gail was right beside her on the bed. "I wondered what happened, but then I saw the green beans dripping out the side of her mouth, and I had to laugh. I couldn't be mad at her."

Gail says, "We absolutely love lvy. We had Sassy Pants for two years. When we lost her, it broke our hearts. I got so emotional, but it's like Sassy sent lvy to me."

It also sounds like someone sent Gail and her husband to Ivy...



Joy, the sister who had completely shut down, is now Josie. Rita and Lois had lost Callie. Luckily, they still had Paris but were worried Paris (who also came from a breeder and LAGR) would regress without a canine friend around. However, did they want a senior? Could they stand to lose another dog so soon after Callie? Josie's moms said, "You never know how long you'll have them. Josie was a little older than the dog we envisioned, but even a young dog could develop cancer." Knowing there's never any guarantees, they gambled... and won bigtime with the sister they adopted.

It sounds like Josie knows she's finally home...

Eve, the sister that was a combination of shyness and confidence is now Ginger and has a canine sister (Gypsy, a chocolate lab from a breeder and LAGR) and two canine brothers. Ginger digs giant holes, which is probably great fun for a dog that never got the chance to dig in the dirt. A big yard compared to a narrow concrete run? This is heaven for a dog who previously knew nothing but the life of a breeder girl.

She watches her four-legged sister and one of her brothers as they play, and she's getting closer and closer to joining them.

Ginger loves everyone she meets and is a real couch potato. She's terrified of the car and is scared of balls, but with time, she'll get comfortable. "She sees Clifford and Gypsy playing with a ball and probably wonders why they aren't frightened. She'll come around," says Barb, her mom. Barb laughed. "I'm going to have to get a video of her. She's so funny. When I get up, Ginger smiles and dances around. She grabs my sleeve, closes her eyes and smiles as she continues to dance. She's just a sweet dog."

All three of these senior girls are sweet. Thankfully, in just a short time they've found a sweet life in their forever homes...



Presidents Message

Hi.

This year we have taken in 3 dogs as of February 12th. Sammuel is heartworm positive around 2 ½ years old. Ripley is an 11 ½ year old beautiful, active girl. She is spunky for her age and loves water. Hamish is an energetic 8 ½ year old. He's an active red dog--a well-trained, great boy. All three were owner surrenders.

In 2016, we took in 51 dogs; 27 of those were females, 24 were males, 37 were purebred and 14 were mixes. Of the 51 dogs last year, 21 were owner surrenders, 3 came from shelters, 9 were from breeders, 4 were born in rescue and 14 were flown in from Turkey. Their ages ranged from newborn to 12 years old. This year we will again take a few dogs from Turkey. The first 4 will arrive at the end of April.

We find the number of dogs we receive has declined in the last 5 years. However the condition of the dogs is generally worse, which means the dogs require more vetting and more extensive care.

We are so lucky to have such wonderful people adopt our dogs, and we thank you. Seeing dogs come to us in pathetic shape, it's heartwarming to see them blossom in their forever homes.

Our 5 K run is scheduled for May 27th at Creve Coeur Park. This year, we are again partnering with Retrievers and Friends for this event. Last year was such a great success. Be on the lookout for more info.

We will again host our trivia night on August 19th in St Charles which is always a fun evening. Also please mark your calendar for our annual Reunion Picnic, a highlight of our year, which is scheduled for September 16th at Vago Park in Maryland Heights. We are in desperate need of foster homes and new volunteers. Please consider opening up your home to a dog on a temporary basis or joining us as a volunteer. We ask volunteers to do two things a year, things as simple as baking dog treats, making baskets for trivia or getting more involved such as doing home visits. Currently, we are in need of volunteers to help with our 5 K run. Thank you all for your support, your generosity and the love you show these wonderful dogs.

Dear Charlie.

This is not true. The chow chow is an ancient breed and the origin of the "black tongue" rumor is a mystery. The chow is not the only breed with a blue-black tongue. For example, Chinese shar pei dogs also have this trait. Spots on tongues are simply deposits of extra pigment, like birthmarks and freckles on people. Dogs often have spots of dark pigment on their skin hiding under their coats. These spots can be large or small, many or few.

For example Tater, the mom of "Tater's tots," has a black spot on her tongue. Most of the dogs in that litter also have a black spot on their tongues. Those dogs are all gold--Tater is a full-blooded golden, and their daddy was also.

I hope this information is helpful. Next time someone stops you and talks about your tongue, tell them, "I am one colorful guy. My fur is golden, my tongue is pink and black and my heart... and my heart is pure gold."

He is pretty resourceful, and I put nothing past him. I wish we had a security camera for that one!




