Kevin's Journey

Since February, there has been a partnership with nine American and four Chinese rescues working tirelessly to find a way to help dogs in China. The goal: bring 99 dogs to the U.S. Each rescue group had dogs they were looking forward to getting.

Love a Golden Rescue was going to get two dogs--Kevin and Yuan Yuan.

Without some intervening forces, the dogs would have stayed in cramped shelter conditions for what would likely be years. Everyone knew this rescue would be a challenge. After securing permission from countless officials and getting numerous permits signed, the charter plane was ready to carry the dogs to America. Hours before it was scheduled to take off, permission to fly was cancelled.

A new plan was developed. Instead of one plane carrying all 99 goldens, we would bring a few at a time, on climate-controlled cargo planes. Even though the logistics were extremely complicated to ensure each dog would get where they needed to go, it was realized this was the only way the dogs could be saved.



On August 31st, two volunteers from LAGR traveled to Chicago to meet the plane from China on September 1st. We were very excited. Once in Chicago we found there had been a change of flights the 12 dogs were travelling on—LAGR's two dogs and 10 dogs for RAGOM. This change caused a long layover in Taiwan.



Finally, the dogs arrived. They were checked by the CDC. We had to get CDC's official “okay” before the dogs were released. We waited and waited until finally we were told one of the dogs had passed away. We were all devastated. This rescue had been planned and dreamed about for months, and to lose a dog before it enjoyed some freedom broke our hearts. At that time, we did not know which dog had died, but later found it was our Yuan Yuan. Until an autopsy could be done, all the dogs had to be quarantined.

This became a new nightmare. Where could 11 dogs be quarantined? At the time, we did not know for how long the quarantine would last. Finally, after hours and hours, a boarding facility stepped up and offered to quarantine them for a few days. Where to get the autopsy done was another question. It would take some time to get Yuan Yuan to the University in Champaign. It was decided she would be taken to the zoo in Chicago. Until the autopsy was completed, all we could do was wait.

We stayed an additional night in Chicago, hoping the phone call would come to say the dogs were released. This did not happen, so we drove home to St Louis and the RAGOM people drove back to Minnesota.

Finally, late on Thursday, we heard the cause of death was pneumonia. Yuan Yuan was also tested for Covid, which was negative, and the dogs were finally released.

Yet another obstacle: the dogs were in Chicago, and we are in our home states. Our savior was a person named Rich. He arranged for all the dogs to be flown by Pilots N Paws. On Friday the 4th of September, I went to Creve Coeur Airport to meet Kevin. I was immediately struck by what a beautiful dog he was and overwhelmed by what a journey he had gone on. He got off the plane like it was just another day, so full of life and so resilient.

Kevin's Foster Home

Learning about the mission to rescue the 99 dogs in China was my introduction to Love A Golden Rescue. I saw the number of U.S. rescue organizations involved in the effort, then did some quick math, only to discover that they would probably need more foster homes. I soon learned that LAGR is in the St. Louis area, and I contacted the organization to volunteer our home.

Our family was in mourning after learning about the death of Yuan Yuan, whose arrival we had been anticipating for months. Being able to foster Kevin helped to diminish our sadness.

We were introduced to Kevin, a very red retriever that was energetic and a little gangly. He gave himself a tour of our home after arriving, then he and our cat made a pact to coexist. We spent much of the time playing in our yard. However, his playfulness did not stop.

Kevin had quite the experience and did not settle down for days. He was in constant motion and had to be continually engaged with being petted, playing, or finding something to play with. Finding something to play with led to another predicament. He was a power chewer, so we had to make sure his toys could not be destroyed or eaten. Eating was another concern. Kevin burped a lot from eating and drinking too fast, so we had to slow him down. He was also hyper-focused about food which added another element to the problem.

After about a week, Kevin started to relax and began sleeping during the day. He started to eat more slowly and was able to go back to eating out of a regular dog dish. After two weeks, he began to ease his focus on food and started behaving more like a typical dog. Even though he was more at ease in his new environment, his craving for affection never waned. He was the biggest snuggle pup whenever he was awake and not playing.

Kevin's first trip after his quarantine ended was going to the vet to get his flu booster, where we learned that he had gained four pounds since his arrival in St. Louis. Now it was time to start thinking about placing him in a forever home. I couldn't imagine placing him in a home where everyone was away most of the day. It would perhaps be okay if there was another dog or if he would go to doggie daycare. I was intrigued when I learned that there was a prospective home that had four other dogs. When I talked to the family on the phone about Kevin, they were delighted and undaunted by everything I told them about him.

Kevin's Forever Home

Kevin is the perfect dog. We followed the national story of goldens trying to get out of China with many delays and challenges, and we donated to try and help. We saw the Facebook post from LAGR that at least one made his way to St. Louis on Sept 5th with Pilots N Paws, and he was a gorgeous red! We were not planning on getting another pup, but our beloved patriarch—Budde—passed away suddenly at 14-1/2 years old on Sept 7th. Budde also came to us from LAGR, and while we still mourn him, we were convinced Budde sent Kevin to us. We don't know Kevin's actual birthday, so we will celebrate it on Sept 7th as a tribute to Budde.



Kevin is doing great! He now has three sisters and a brother (all goldens) who are helping him learn English (and when to pretend like he doesn't know English). Kevin melted into the pack like he had been here for years. He either has a Kong toy or tennis ball in his mouth, or he is wrestling with his siblings. He got a clean bill of health from our vet and the whole office wanted to meet "Kevin, the golden retriever from China." We encourage our pups to get on the furniture and sleep in bed with us and just be dogs, which suits him fine since he has taken over an oversized lounge chair. He loves to shop for treats, do zoomies in the backyard, sport his American Flag collar, go on car rides to Starbucks, and will be going to school soon to get his Canine Good Citizen. We are so lucky to have him as part of our family and would love to thank all the people who helped in any way to bring him into our lives.

Presidents Message

Hi, I hope you had an enjoyable summer and were able to stay safe. As a rescue, we have been able to keep our heads above water with the help of our loyal donors, so we thank you.

At the beginning of August, we decided to put together a calendar. Could we pull it off? The answer is yes. With the help of adopters who sent great photo submissions and Minuteman Press in Bridgeton who put it all together by the middle of September, we had our beautiful calendar. We still have a small amount for sale. A big thank you to all who have purchased one.

Gretchen had her first hip surgery in September. She is slowly getting stronger, but it is going to be a long journey as this leg has to be strong enough to hold her weight before she can have her second surgery. It may be four to six months before that happens. She goes to water therapy each week which will help her get stronger. In December, another young golden girl will have her first FHO. When she came to rescue, she was 7 months and needed to be close to 12 months before surgery. Like Gretchen, her hips are also severe and will have a long journey before her second surgery.

That makes 4 expensive hip surgery dogs this year. Ana and Dixie (the other hip surgery dogs) are in their forever homes. We also have a senior golden who is going through heartworm treatment.

After many setbacks, all the China dogs are in the USA. The original plan to bring them on a chartered plane in early July was cancelled when permission was withdrawn by authorities in China. All the rescues involved were devastated. The leaders of this project were determined to get the dogs to America, so they did not spend time in crowded shelters or worse for the rest of their lives. Finally, a new plan to bring them a few at a time was put into place, and that has happened over the last six weeks.

There are still many in need, and China Dog Rescue <https://chinarescuedogs.org/> is raising money to bring more dogs to America. We are also taking a few dogs from Turkey. They have to fly with a flight volunteer. Initially a large group would come on a cargo plane, but the cost got to be too unrealistic to continue. When you see these dogs go to their forever homes, it is just so rewarding.

Keepers Korner





He was thirteen and a half years old and came to us when he was three from Love A Golden Rescue, where they treated his heartworm condition and got weight on him. When Rebel's foster parents brought him, he had a big red Kong in his mouth, but it quickly became clear that as far as he was concerned, humans were put on Earth to throw tennis balls for him to retrieve and drop at their feet, so they could throw it again--over and over and over! He became legendary for dropping a tennis ball in front of anyone and stepping back, waiting for the throw. Do it once, and he'd never leave you alone! He dropped a ball into a muddy trench where a water line was being replaced, so the guys working on the job would throw it for him--and they did! A neighbor saw him carrying a tennis ball in his mouth and started leaving used balls on her lawn; from then on, Rebel thought the purpose of every walk was to go to her house and get another ball. She lived five blocks and four streets away, but he quickly learned exactly where to go. It became a challenge to get him to go another direction, and at one point we had at least seventy tennis balls in our backyard. He would occasionally put a ball on the bed at night, leaving a surprise for when you rolled over. Even when his legs were failing him, he would find a ball to take any time we went outside.

I loved taking Rebel sailing, just the two of us. When we weren't out on the water, he would run up and down the marina docks, barking at the birds flying thirty feet overhead. He put up with two Labrador Retriever service dog puppies, even when the first one shredded his big beautiful tail like a three-year-old kid with scissors. He took two firsts and a second in peanut butter eating contests at the annual Love A Golden Rescue reunion picnics.

Rebel was my best buddy from the start, and an enormous comfort when my wife passed away. He was a fun, happy boy, and his wagging tail and smile made coming home the best part of any day. I was truly blessed to have had him in my life. He will always be in my heart and thinking of him will make me smile. Now he's chasing balls in a better place with no pain.
