Love A Golden at the Rhode Island Pet Expo-Kim Seigler, LAGR Volunteer



Home Made Party Cake

CAKE INGREDIENTS

2/3 cup ripe mashed bananas

1/2 cup softened butter

3 large eggs

3/4 cup water

2 cups Unbleached Flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1/2 cup chopped pecans

1/2 cup raisins

FROSTING

2 cup mashed banana

1 tablespoon butter

6 tablespoons carob flour

2 teaspoons vanilla

3 tablespoons unbleached flour

1 teaspoon cinnamon



Cake

In mixing bowl, beat together mashed banana and butter until creamy. Add eggs and water. Beat well. Stir in dry ingredients. Beat until smooth. Add nuts and raisins. Spoon batter evenly into oiled and floured bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about 35 minutes. Cool on wire rack 5 minutes, remove from pan, replace on rack and cool.

Frosting

Blend thoroughly and spread on cool cake. Sprinkle with chopped pecans. The frosting contains carob, which is a safe (almost tastes like) chocolate substitute.

WHAT TRAINING METHOD IS BEST? BY BILL GILCHRIST

What training method is best for my dog? This is the most frequently asked question when someone adopts a dog. Upon adopting, a responsible person not only wants to provide love, shelter and care but also a clear communication pattern so that their new family member can be a productive citizen in their new living environment. With so many opinions and methods available to a dog owner it is understandable why so many people are confused. Here are just a few things to consider when choosing a training method.

First, find a training program that matches your dog's needs, age and personality. Your dog's needs should be based upon an evaluation done by the owner working with the adoption agency and/or a Certified Trainer. For example, "needs" can be one or more behavioral issues that may include hyperactivity, aggression, separation anxiety, lack of socialization, etc. The dog's age will also have a lot to do with the evaluation process. Young dogs tend to display many behavioral issues that can be addressed over time. Adult dogs, that may be more set in their ways, may require more of a crash course to change their outlook on right and wrong. Personality is another major determining factor in choosing a training method. Personality should be determined during the evaluation discussed earlier. Some personality traits may include hyper, fearful, happy-go-lucky, aggressive, shy-submissive, and dominant or even a basket case. Basket case is a term used to refer to a dog that demonstrates more than one personality trait. Choosing a training method that reflects these basic variables will go a long way in insuring success.

Second, once you have evaluated your dog, it is best to find a trainer with experience in your dog's individual characteristics. Don't immediately choose the first trainer you find. Interview multiple trainers and ask for references. It is your right as well as your responsibility to ask for referrals of clients that share your circumstances. A reputable trainer will be more than happy to provide these references. Not only is it important for your trainer to be a good match with your dog, but it is equally important that he/she match up with you. Some things that you may want to consider in making your choice are: Do you have children that will be working with the dog? Do you have any disability or ailment that may preclude you from certain training exercises? Do you like to travel? Even your environment should all be taken into consideration. A trainer who has experience working with these characteristics and/or lifestyles will be better equipped to help you.

Not only is it important to evaluate your trainer's experience with your given situation, it is also important to evaluate his/her training style. Any good trainer should have knowledge of several training methods. It is impossible to match one training method with every dog and their owner. A trainer that matches your dog to a specific training method based on the circumstances that you have determined to be true is a trainer worth working with.

Third, understanding training methods is your ultimate key to success. While there are several methods to choose from, they all have traits in common with one another. Understanding the nuances between them is the tricky part. Command training and treat reward training are two of the basics. Command training or "force training" is a method of training that requires your dog to learn commands not tricks. This training method is based on three principles: praise, motivation and correction. These principles are highly adaptable. Praise can vary from physical and verbal to treat or toy reward. Motivation is anything that will help your dog learn the command at hand and can range from touch, sound or treat and toy placement. Correction is the third key and is usually the hardest for an owner to accept as part of the training. Corrections can vary from physical to verbal. A correction should only be used once your dog understands the command at hand and is being stubborn or non-compliant. A physical correction is usually a tug on a collar or halti. A correction should never be given to a dog that is fearful or confused. Treat reward training is a great method to use for puppies or shy-submissive dogs. It is based on the simple premise of compliance-reward. This training method will help your dog learn quickly and without a physical correction. The down side is that it may be short lived. Once the novelty wears off, your dog may not be reliable in times of distraction and he or she may find other things to reward him/herself with.

So what method is better? Neither. The best method is the one that employs both aspects and utilizes variable training. An owner or trainer needs to determine the method based upon the circumstances of the moment. Locking one-self into a single method usually brings failure and/or frustration. Learn to adjust and absorb information and apply what is best for your individual circumstance.

Remember the most important aspect of any training method is Love, Patience and Consistency. Utilizing these keys as well as understanding your dog's individual needs and personality will put you on the road to success.

Just as it is necessary for our children to have a strong foundation in education, the same holds true for our puppy's future. The three following commands will be enable to do anything and go anywhere with your dog.

They are Recall; Stay and Heeling.

It is that simple! All three are the basic foundations and lead in commands to any type of work you wish to do with your dog. More importantly, these three are the dogs life saving commands.

Recall is more than just getting the dog in from your backyard when you are in rush to get out of the house. It is an important part of the bonding process. For your dog to come 100% of the time when you call it, the dog must first see you as something better than what they are presently doing. Imagine Fluffy is out in the yard chasing squirrels. You call for Fluffy to come in. Now Fluffy has two choices. Stay and chase squirrels, which is just a great thing to do, or come in to you. Every time Fluffy comes to you, there is bonding. Fluffy is saying, "You are great and I can't wait to be with you!" Every time Fluffy ignores you, well, you get the picture.

For recall to become 100% effective, you need to spend time developing this process. If you call Fluffy and she turns and looks at you, then continues doing what she wants or even worse ignores you completely, you have a bonding problem. No matter if this happens even once or every time she is called, recall is something you must work on.

Lets take this to one extreme. Fluffy gets out through the door. She heads out towards the road and there is a car coming, you call and Fluffy ignores the command as she does in the backyard, this time, the outcome is horrible. If you think, "She *usually* comes when I call her," start working now.

Recall is the hardest of all the commands to implement, but the easiest to rectify. Most people wait until they need the dog to do something before trying to teach a command. Often times, we are teaching the compete opposite of what we really need the dog to learn. How many times have you called the dog, it ignored you and you have done nothing to correct the situation. In this instance, what you have taught the dog to do ignore you. When was the last time Fluffy got a hold of something it shouldn't have and you chased her around the house to get it from her? Fluffy has learned that grabbing things becomes a great game. She has fun running around the house and by the sounds you are making, you must be having fun too! At what age did Fluffy learn where your arm ended and what distance they needed to be from you so you couldn't catch her. Again, you chase her around screaming for her to 'Come" to you. What Fluffy hears is that the "Come" command must mean run as fast as you can the other way! The first time you call Fluffy and she doesn't respond, should be the last time Fluffy is allowed to not be connected to you! A long piece of clothes line, a retractable leash or a cotton web training leash will help to solve the problem. Each and every time you call your dog, there is an option in the dogs mind to either comply or not. A connection to the dog, removes the option.

What is at the end of the rainbow to make Fluffy want to come to you? It is attention! As a puppy, Fluffy should learn to look in your direction when you say her name. To make this happen, use a treat. Have her connected to a line which you are holding, to keep her close and say, "Fluffy!" The instant she looks at you, give her a little taste. After 10 time of doing this in a row, Fluffy should be sitting there looking at you with adoration in her eyes. Now you have her attention.

Take the attention and start to back away from her just a few steps at a time. Call her to "Come," when she gets to you, treat. Before you know it, Fluffy will be following you around the yard a few steps at a time.

This exercise can be done with any dog at any age. Sometimes you have to change the treat or be a little more excited when you call the dog, but it works simply and easily. Since many rescues have not had basic skills, this is a good way to start bonding with your new forever pet. **To Be Continued**



A Purpose for Petting: Dog Massage

One of the most basic of all senses is touching. It is one of the first senses that is available to us from birth. In all cases, human or animal alike, if the basics of touch is there from the beginning of life, an infant or pup will develop faster, have an increased growth rate as well as becoming more active and more alert that those depraved of this sense. We have seen from studies that touch can aid in the reduction of blood pressure and stress levels for the person and the pet greatly benefit from the desirable interaction.

There are several ways to perform this interaction action between a person and their animal companion, the following discusses several points about pet massage, techniques and Miss Daisy our tripod connoisseur of massage will provide you some insight from animal perspective...

Whose body is it anyway......Well don't be surprised if your pup asks you this question....I very well aware of my body and it's needs....even though you don't always agree about the extra cookies needed by my stomach or the 2AM walks just to sniff who was outside....Remember massage is much more effective if it's a cooperative effort.

Lightly...I say......Pressure is to be reserved for you humans in your business meeting and not for my massage. Pressure for small dogs, pup and cats is approximately 1 pound of finger tip pressure, and larger animals can withstand 5 pounds of fingertip pressure. Too much pressure will constrict my blood flow and make me an uneasy and unhappy pup. If I'm especially tight in an area due to a muscle spasm...too much fetch....I told you so...just repeat light gentle stroke over the area.

Let you fingers do the listening..... Massage is not a substitute for veterinary care, but you are more familiar with my body and any lump or bump you find will be checked out sooner. As you move your hands along your pet's body be aware of signs of inflammation, such as heat, tightness, swelling or discoloration. It's tacky for us to have to call the vet's for our own appointment...this way you can notice any unusual spot or tenderness that you may wish for the Vet to check out.

Start with my ear's....they say that ears can tell a lot about the person.....in the case of a dog....it's the way to our heart. Start by gently rubbing the inside of the ear with the pad of your index finger....Wait 1st and foremost, make sure that you check the ear, avoid it if there is any signs or symptoms of inflammation....for you fingers sake....As long as there is no heat, redness, swelling or discharge from the ear canal then you may proceed. Rub the inner surface of the ear with the pad of you index finger in small swirling strokes, making sure to cover all inner surface areas. Next proceed with holding your dog's head in your hands by the cheeks and under the ears (with the dog facing you) and rock the head gently side-to-side 4 - 5 times. Massage the ears, taking care when you finish by inserting the tip of your thumb into the ear (about 1/8") and rub the ears between your thumb and forefinger.

Massaging your dog has many benefits:

- 1)Relaxes your dog.
- 2) Soothes tired or sore muscles.
- 3) Eases pain from surgery or other injuries.
- 4) Helps your dog suffering from ailments caused by old age to feel better.
- 5) Gains your dog's trust.
- 6) Noticeably increases the bond between you and your dog.
