Thelma and Louise


We got a call from the Humane Society on Macklind Avenue in St. Louis. The call was about two female Goldens who were rescued from a terrible puppy mill. I went to the Humane Society to check them out. There I found them huddled together in a little area. I was told "this is Thelma & Louise". As soon as they heard us, they curled up in a ball and hid their faces in the corner. We picked them up and brought them out of the area, put them on lead. When we tried to leave the area with them, they totally freaked out and would not move a muscle. We had to carry them outside to a fenced area in order to get a better look at them. They were completely terrified of me. Once in the fenced area they started to move around a bit as long as I did not look at them or move around. The Humane Society employee sat on the ground and called to them, but they did not respond. Then he pulled out a tennis ball and they lit up. They wanted the ball, but did not trust him. We sat with them for a bit. Every noise they heard scared them. They would run to the corner and stand real close to one another. I noticed the one they called Thelma would lick the other one's (Louise) face. Once we took them back inside, I was told they would be ready to go in a couple days. I came back for the girls a few days later, my husband and I came prepared with two crates and the Humane Society loaned us a big dolly to put the crates on. They carried them out to us one by one, scared, shaking, and drooling uncontrollably. We took the girls home, they smelled terrible, their coats were falling out and their eyes were runny. Thelma was very thin, while Louise was a bit on the heavy side. It took hours to get them out of crates, we finally took the crates apart to get them out. They were so scared, they would not walk. We had to carry them in and out to potty after we "trapped" them. They would not make eye contact, and would run from us. They lived behind our sofa for many weeks. In the beginning, they would only come out at night while we were asleep. We took baby steps with them. They were

Introduced to the world a bit at a time. After some time, Thelma started to get interested in us, which showed Louise it was okay too. Over time they started to take bits of chicken breast from our hands, then regular treats. We taught them to climb stairs, walk on lead, and most of all to trust us. They so enjoyed being a beloved pet. It was a long journey with them, but a wonderful one. It is so rewarding to work with these type dogs. When you get that first glimpse of hope in their eyes, or the first time they lick your hand.....it is all worth it. After 5 months we knew they were ready for their forever homes. While it was hard to let them go, we check on them often (probably too often if you ask their new families). They are both blossoming everyday in their new homes. This is what rescue is all about.


I wasn't looking for two dogs, but how could I separate them. I filled out the application on-line and sent it off. Jan called me the same evening. I was too late to adopt Thelma, but Louise was still available. However, Kathy Riggs, who was fostering Louise, felt like she needed to go to a home with another dog. You see, Louise didn't know how to be a dog. They recommended I meet Louise at PetCo in Chesterfield.

So the Sunday after Thanksgiving, off to St. Louis I went. I met Louise and fell in love. I wanted to take her home with me right then. There were still reservations about Louise going to home without a sibling, but finally all the paperwork and approvals were completed and I was able to take Louise home. I picked her up at

Kathy's on December 7th, 2007. I changed the name from Louise to Louisa and added the Pearl in

honor of Pearl Harbor Day. I now had me a "Louisa Pearl".

Our first solo adventure was heart breaking. She was scared to get in the vehicle for the ride to her new home. She cowered in the corner on the back seat floorboard. We had a two hour drive to her new home. I was singing along with soothing Christmas carols and talking to her. She eventually stretched out on the floorboard and I petted her all the way home. Yes, my arm was still in my



The first night she cowered under the bed never moving. The second night she stayed on the dog bed. The third night she jumped up on the bed and has been there every night since! She sleeps on a queen size bed and now she thinks she is the Queen of Sheba. In the morning, she will be next to me with her paw seeking attention and at night sometimes she will curl up beside me with her head on my chest. Louisa shows her playful side when she is on the bed. She will stretch and reach to be petted and jump around on the bed. Progress has been made!

The first week I despaired. Louisa was so skittish and fearful. She wouldn't eat or drink. The best I could do was hand feed her and squirt water in her mouth. Her secure places were the couches in the family room and living room and the bed; and they still are! Finally, after 5 days, I called my friend Sis and said I needed to borrow her Golden, Maddie.

On Friday I picked Maddie up for a doggie play day with Louisa. Out the door they went. Halleluiah! Louisa was jumping and skipping around and doing her business in the back yard! The next two days Sis brought Maddie over for more play days During Christmas week, I was lucky to have Maddie stay with us. Maddie loves to chase balls so outside we went. Initially, Louisa sat and watched. Her next step was going half way to the ball. I would retrieve the ball and she would walk back with me. On Christmas Day, I let "the girls" out and she actually ran across the yard and got the ball. What a wonderful Christmas gift.

During Maddie's visit she also learned to play with and destroy toys. Louisa became possessive with her toys. When Maddie had a toy, Louisa would watch her, as soon as Maddie's attention was elsewhere, Louisa would be off the couch, grab the toy, and back on the couch in a flash. Another socialization skill achieved.

Louisa has come a long way over the nine weeks I have had her. She is a great walker, trots right along beside me unless something startles her. She will follow me from room to room, but won't walk past me in a room. She goes to her bowl to eat as long as I'm not beside it. She will take treats from me readily if I bring them to her and will try to take them out of my pocket, but won't come to me to take a treat. She stands on the couch and wants to come for the treat, but just doesn't have the courage.

Inside of Louisa is a heart of gold, but she just hasn't realized it yet. Everyday I work on unlocking her heart by showering her with love, providing a safe environment, and allowing her to gradually become a pet and companion. When she finds the key to unlock her heart she will be the most faithful companion and friend I could ask to have. Once again, I have been blessed with a Golden.

Bella

I have been transporting dogs on rescue runs for years, but will never forget Bella. I met my contact Ruth, to transfer Bella from her vehicle to mine. Bella had been rescued from a puppy mill in Missouri. Ruth told me that "this dog is very scared". Well, I've seen scared dogs before—but never anything like Bella. She wasn't just scared with the transport experience – this dog was traumatized. She wouldn't jump out of Ruth's station wagon, we had to lift her out and she couldn't or wouldn't stand. I thought the muscles in her back legs were atrophied at first, so we put her on the nice grassy verge so she could do her business. She wouldn't turn her back on us but watched so warily.

We lifted her into the back of my SUV—she cowered into the farthest corner for the entire trip. I spoke soothingly to her the whole way, and once in a while caught her looking at me in the mirror—when she saw me watching her, she

quickly averted her eyes.

Arriving at my destination, before Golden Rescue met me to take Bella to St. Louis. I climbed into the back of my SUV with her. She was terrified of me. I realized it was not lack of human contact that frightened her as with some puppy mill dogs, but the fact that the humans she had come in contact with had been cruel. This was confirmed when I slowly raised my hand to pet her, talking gently to reassure her, and she cowered and yelped. This girl had been hit hard many times.

Bella is aptly named. She is one of the most gorgeous, young, Golden Retrievers I have ever seen with beautiful pale copper coloring and the perfect face of a Golden. But there was something missing—that joyful spirit all Goldens exhibit was gone. Bella just broke my heart. But she is one of the lucky ones—she has been saved from a horrible fate. There are hundreds of dogs in puppy mills who won't get a second chance at life.

What Bella has going for her is that she is a Golden Retriever! She will regain her spirit, be rehabilitated by Golden Rescue and adopted by a loving family. In time she will recover from her bad experiences, learn how to play, and forgive and forget the humans who mistreated her. She may forgive them, but I never will.

When Bella came to our home at Thanksgiving she crawled along on her tummy, she would not stand up straight. When she went outside to go potty she ran to the corner of the yard shaking, if a human was anywhere around. We watched her from the window until she went potty, and we were able to walk to the corner and pick up the leash to bring her into the house.

Over the last two months she has improved. Outside, she is happiest when it is a sunny day and she is outside by herself, walking around the yard, (she now walks tall outside). At first it was constant circles but over time she stops to sniff, and breaks her circles until she sees a human then the circles resume. One day we saw her rolling, it was as if we had a baby who had just taken its first steps. We were overjoyed and called several people with the news, 'Bella was acting like a Golden with no cares'. The same thing happened when she picked up a tennis ball and played with it. Unfortunately she has only done that once but the rolling happens often these days. It is now a challenge to get her in the house. She is so happy when outside and her personality comes shining through when she plays keep away to not come in. We have our helper, Daisy one of our own Goldens who runs along side of her and guides her to a corner where we are able to leash her and she comes into the house. Bella always cowers as the leash is attached.

In the house she is learning very slowly. She darts around confused and scared in a hunched position, until she finds her favorite dog bed and will lie there for hours. She will watch us along with our Goldens the whole time. We hope she will learn that we are not to be feared. She loves to be brushed and we lay with her petting her and gently talking to her. She is now more comfortable and will close her eyes and relax. This is a big step.


