# A "Tail" of Two Blind Dogs

Two dogs: Finn and Daisy. One was blind when he came to Love a Golden Rescue. One became totally blind after she had come (back) to Love a Golden Rescue, and after she had gotten adopted a second time. For the vast majority of us who have never fostered or lived with a blind dog, we might consider it a near-impossible endeavor. How could we make a dog comfortable and safe, not having its sight to rely on? What strategies could we use to help "train" a blind dog so that it can navigate in our house and yard?

Although most of us would immediately dismiss ourselves as not being capable of adequately caring for a dog that cannot see, perhaps after you read the following "tails," you might consider being an owner/foster the next time a blind dog needs help.

#### Finn

When we first agreed to foster Finn, a 10-year old blind dog, we thought 'this could be interesting as well as challenging.' As the time got closer to get our blind guy, we became more apprehensive. We wondered: could we really take care of him, would he fit in with our pack, could this really work? When we picked him up, we listened closely to everything being told to us. Then it was time to bring him home. He loved the car ride and slept almost all the way home. Great, we made it past our first step.

At home, we walked Finn slowly around our yard to let him sniff and leave his scent. He was very frightened, finding himself in a new place, not able to see. He had no idea who these two new strangers were or what the new smells were all about. We let him "chill out" in the large kennel that we have in our basement. We led him to the water dish as well as his food dish. We also led him around the kennel so that he could get an idea of where things were, especially his new bed.



The next day, we started walking Finn in the neighborhood. We would walk past a few houses and then go back home. Each day, we would walk past another house. It was interesting to see how he would walk faster when he could smell his scent. However, the minute we started walking past a new house, he would slow down. The first night we walked him, it took us twenty minutes to walk by four houses. We kept talking to him, calling his name and clapping. At first, we thought he was hard of hearing, but after a week, we realized that he just didn't know our voices or know how to respond. As Finn became more familiar with us and our voices, he began responding to us. We are now walking him around the block, and he has a cute little trot. He is very comfortable walking and even seems to be very proud of himself.

We also took our time introducing Finn to our pack. We would let him sniff one dog and then walk that one with him. After a few days, we would introduce him to another one, and they would walk together. This entire time, he was still staying in our large kennel in the basement whenever he was not with us.

After a few weeks, we knew it was time for Finn to come upstairs into our house. We would bring him up and hook his leash to us. We also hooked his leash to the banister. We learned quickly that even though he is a little guy, he is strong for his size. That meant no hooking him to chairs. He could pull them around, and we did not want him to get hurt. Finn is now upstairs all the time and loves his smaller kennel where he sleeps at night. We still don't leave him free unless he is in a room with us by himself. We want to keep him safe from bumping into too many things.

Finn has totally amazed us being completely blind for so many years and able to do the things he can do. He found the water dish the first time he was upstairs. Being attached to us, he led us to it and immediately began drinking. He does very well walking up and down stairs; he "conquered" that within a week's time. He likes to play with tennis balls, even though he loses them fairly quickly. He will find them and continue playing with them. He loves to find used tissues in the waste basket (no matter how far back under the counter we have the waste basket). He has really amazed us by finding the fuzzy socks in a basket of laundry. Finn might not have eyesight, but there is definitely nothing wrong with any of his other senses. He has adapted to us and our pack and seems very comfortable. The best thing is that he doesn't know he has a disability. He is a happy boy just the way he is! **An update on Finn**: As this newsletter was being finalized, Finn was adopted into his forever home.

#### Miss Daisy

I feel knowing Daisy's past is important to understanding the dog she is today.

Daisy was two when she injured her foot, and although she was taken to a vet for treatment, the family did not want to pay her bill, so they simply left her there. After several months, the vet became her owner, and she then came to rescue in June 2005. A month later, she was adopted.

All was good for four months; she was very happy, and the family loved her. In November of 2005, we received a call. Her family wanted to return Daisy to LAGR, as she had MRSA staph infection and aspergillosis fungus in her nose. The family did not wait for us to respond; incredulous, we

heard she was at a vet to be euthanized. A volunteer rushed to get her, and she boomeranged back to rescue.



Her long medical journey began. Daisy had three infusions to remove the fungus, none of which worked. She finally had surgery to remove the fungus. A mass of fungus the size of a golf ball was found in her sinus cavity. All of the fungus was removed. She recovered from the surgery in a few weeks. We also found she is immunosuppressed and would be plagued by frequent sinus infections. Later, her foster home adopted her.

Fast forward to 2010...We noticed Daisy's right eye was looking cloudy. We took her to the doggie eye doctor, and she was diagnosed with glaucoma. Since her degeneration was not text book for a Golden, it was thought the blindness was associated with her surgery and would probably not affect the other eye. It was decided to remove the right eye, thus eliminating pain while trying to maintain the pressure. Again, all was good, and Daisy adjusted.

In 2011, the left eye began to deteriorate, again glaucoma was the cause, and she became blind. We have not removed this eye, maintaining the pressure with eyes drops. This was not an easy decision for us. In the back of our minds, we wondered, 'What if she can see a little?' even though we knew she could not.

As a Golden that went blind while living in the home she knows well, she has adjusted and is amazing. Daisy climbs stairs, always knowing where the water bowl is. When we put ice in the bowl, she loves it. She is constantly bumping into things, because she misjudges the space she is moving through. She walks very slowly with a slow prance, like the Lipizzaner stallions in slow motion. Sometimes we find her stuck in a corner and help her turn around. Daisy gets confused in the yard, but when we call her, she can easily correct herself. We help her by patting our leg, and she follows that sound, which helps her avoid bumping into the door frame.

Daisy goes on two walks a day; we follow the same route, as she has her scent to guide her. If we walk a different route, she gets confused, but the next time we go that way, she is fine. She also gets to go on walks off leash in a safe environment with her siblings and follows right along beside us and loves that.

Her Golden siblings seem to understand when she walks into them—they seem to look and say "Oh that is just Daisy." It is not so easy with new foster dogs, because they have to learn she is different. It is a slow process, but they do learn and accept her.

Although she is blind, she has radar for Lou the cat who lives at the vet. On one visit, Lou got a little too close, and Daisy got the end of his tail. Now he always makes himself scarce when Daisy has an appointment, which happens to be every three weeks for an immune booster shot.

She lives a normal live, is very happy and takes all of her many health problems in stride. Even though she can't see with her eyes, Daisy sees that life is good...when you're a beloved dog in a loving home.

# President's Message

Hi.

Thank you to all of you: our loyal volunteers, supporters, adoptive homes and friends. We have completed another successful year helping Goldens and Golden mixes in need.

In 2012, we helped 55 dogs: 34 were purebred, 8 were Golden mixes and 13 were other mixes. During September, October and November of 2012, Golden Retrievers needing rescue did not come our way. It was very quiet for us and other Golden groups. We took the opportunity to help other dogs in shelters—dogs that had golden hearts but didn't have much hope. Dogs like Hawkeye, Hollie, Tootsie and Hogan were adopted very quickly, because they were young adorable mixes.

We also found more dogs coming into rescue already spayed or neutered. Forty-three of the dogs we took in were already fixed. This is very encouraging. Maybe people are taking pet overpopulation seriously!

We are proud to report that this past year we took in 12 seniors. These dogs are near and dear to our hearts and have few options. We are grateful to those who open their homes and hearts to these wonderful seniors. These old-timers deserve a chance to finish out their lives feeling loved and being well cared for.

Last year, we treated little Jeffrey, who had been hit by a car and left in the middle of the road. He survived and now has a wonderful home. Oliver, a senior, broke his leg. Then, he had an allergic reaction to Rimadyl and went into kidney failure. It was very scary. Thankfully, he pulled through and is now up for adoption. We also treated what has become the nom for the dogs we take in: kennel cough, orthopedic surgeries, heartworms, and tick borne disease. Bryanne had to have nine teeth removed, and earlier this month, Sassy had three teeth removed. Several dogs had to go to the doggie eye doctor for different eye problems. Tessa and Joel both had torn cruciate ligaments and are recovering from their surgeries.

Please mark your calendar for our reunion picnic on September 21, 2013. We have changed things up this year, hoping our fall is cooler than our summer. We love to see so many wonderful Goldens and relish the chance to catch up with old friends.

#### Dear Lucki.

That is great news. I will tell you what I have grown to expect from my parents, because they do a fabulous job caring for me. First on my list is love. You will grow to love your new family, and your greatest wish-come-true would be they love you as much as you love them.

Here are some other things that, as loving parents, they will make sure you have. I'll give them to you in no special order:

Good food and fresh water are important to keep you healthy. Dirty water can make you sick, so do not drink from puddles.

You will have what is called a veterinarian in your future. This person looks after your health needs. They probe and poke, but this is for your own good. The veterinarian's office is a place you go, but there's no need to be afraid. It is important to have annual shots, an annual heartworm test and don't forget to bring in a fecal sample. (That's "poop" to us four-legged creatures.) If you do get sick, the vet will find out what is wrong with you.

Each month you will take a heartworm preventative, which is a tasty treat. You will also need a flea and tick preventative every month. This is to stop those nasty little things from taking up residence on you.

My walks are something I love. You may have another type of exercise that you prefer, such as chasing a ball. No matter what kind of activity you like to do, daily exercise of some type is very important.

It doesn't matter how old you are, training is important for any age. However, if you are young, getting some training is a must. The phrase "training" makes it sound like drudgery, but on the contrary, doing something special with your owner is a way of bonding.

Good luck on your new home. All the attention and love that you'll be getting from your forever home will make you soon forget being in a shelter. I promise.




