Driving Miss Daisy Turns into a Disaster... With a Dollop of Joy

There are several LAGR volunteers who pick up surrendered dogs, drive to Chicago to meet flights transporting dogs, drive across the state to get retired breeder dogs, and other dog rescue missions. I'm one of them.

If you're one of the unlucky ones (or lucky ones?) who doesn't get to do this mission work, if you think it's glamorous and exciting to do LAGR's grunt work... well, here's a tale to fill you in on what happened—at least this time.

"Would you like to go to Hannibal and pick up some dogs? Four puppies—two doodles and two goldens—and an adult. We'd leave around 6 in the evening, so it will be a late night."

This was the question Jan asked me. The transfer/transport would take place during one of the hottest weeks–temps had been over 100 degrees–so the connections had to happen in the evening, when it was a bit cooler, since some of the dogs would be traveling in a horse trailer, to Illinois and Wisconsin.

Traveling with Jan is something that frequently happens. The two of us joke that it's like *Driving Miss Daisy*, because Jan can't drive on highways... so she needs a chauffeur. We've developed a rapport. We listen to music CDs, we laugh. Our trips are sometimes stinky (filthy, gassy dogs) but usually fun... until they're not.

This was a large transport, initially 29 puppies and adults with several stops—our stop, one in Illinois, and then the driver would head to Wisconsin. Four golden rescues working together to save these guys. Almost immediately, things changed.

"The doodle breeder said he could get more money for a puppy from a pet store in Florida. Now we're just getting two golden puppies and the adult." Uh oh. We had done the home visits for families who were looking forward to a doodle puppy. Jan would have to break the bad news to them... but it was out of our control. There were 15 doodles so now fewer dogs that needed to be rescued. As a collective group we all knew what had to be done!

Once we hit the road, things were going so smoothly. Too smoothly. We found out later even if we had knocked on wood, it wouldn't have helped this time.

When we were an hour away from Hannibal, Jan got a call. One of the puppies wasn't doing well. It was obvious when the dogs were picked up that something was wrong with the ailing girl. She would need to see a vet ASAP. Could we find an emergency vet in Hannibal? We'd meet there instead of the Lowe's lot. Jan got the address of the emergency animal clinic off her phone, we reprogrammed our route, and headed to 192 Market Street...

... Except that 192 Market Street was now a vacant building. Dusty windows. A parking lot littered with trash. Two Hannibalites who were headed to the bar across the street told us, "Oh, that hasn't been a vet for many years." Why wasn't it updated on the internet?

So, we called the driver. Back to our original plan–Lowe's. We found the truck and horse trailer on the outskirts of the lot. The puppy in need of medical attention was incredibly tiny for her age–8 weeks–and was lying on the passenger seat of the truck, nestled on a folded-up quilt, not moving and barely breathing.

As quickly as we could, we watered the dogs, got our (healthy) puppy and our adult golden situated in their crates in Jan's van. Jan set up a folded-up blanket, the sick pup lay in her lap, and we headed to one of the emergency clinics in St. Louis—we had called ahead. By our estimate, if I drove fast (not that I ever go above the speed limit), we'd get to the clinic a little before 10.



Jan got countless text messages. There were several rescues involved, and everyone was wishing the tiny puppy well. Katie (the adult) and Kirby (the crated puppy) didn't make a sound the whole trip back. They probably were busy sucking up the AC–which we kept blasting, to keep Kelsey (the sick girl) as comfortable as possible. During the trip, there were times Jan had to use her cell phone's flashlight to determine if Kelsey was even still breathing. She was.

After parking in the emergency clinic's parking lot, we called and let them know we were there. "There are three pets in front of you," they told us. We sat in the van, waited, and fidgeted. Four hours of drinking water and iced tea had filled

our bladders to the brim. Normally we would stop at a gas station, but with a life-or-death case (literally) in our laps, we hadn't done anything to delay things. We took our minds off the need to go to the bathroom by counting the number of families who were buzzed in the front door. We were sure it was more than three... but what did we know?



Finally, a tech came to the van, and asked, "Are you with Leo?" We explained that no, we were waiting with Kelsey, and had come from Hannibal. The tech took one look at the barely-alive puppy in my lap, gasped, grabbed her and her blanket-bed, told Jan to follow her, and the three of them rushed into the hospital. Me? I stayed in the van with the two crated canines.

Unfortunately, Kelsey had to be euthanized. She couldn't have been saved—no matter how fast we got there. However, before she crossed the Rainbow Bridge, she got petted, she got loved on, she soaked up whispered well wishes... and she went more quickly and more peacefully than if nature was left to take its course. We're not sure what happened to this tiny puppy. We may never know.



Kirby went for a check-up the next day, and then off to his foster home. Katie has settled into her foster home and is getting taught how to be a pet by another former breeder girl in her foster home, Gretchen.

One dog lost. Two will go to forever homes. We just have to keep remembering that with each dog that is saved, we've made a difference with that dog...

Update following the completion of the article: Katie has been adopted and Kirby is in his foster to adopt home both doing well.

Pope is a one-year-old not-so-golden. He is a happy-go-lucky, playful boy, who also loves to snuggle.

His forever family should have an endless supply of Nylabones or other sturdy chew toys. Ideally, they'd walk him often and/or have another dog for him to play with. Before Pope came to rescue, he was hit by a car (when he was about 8 months old). He has a plate in his back leg, and there was also damage to his growth plate, but it doesn't slow him down in the slightest. He has been evaluated, and this is the way he will be. We'll share his x-rays and vet records with you, if you're the lucky family who decides to adopt Pope. You honestly don't want to miss out on this boy. He is a gem of a puppy!

Right now, she goes to a specialist who is working with her. Cassidy has a wonderful foster mom and family, and she is doing a lot better. Her leaking is so much better—they are working on tweaking her meds.

December is always a busy month for us. We sell dog treats and gift baskets at the Pattonville Craft Fair on December 3rd this year. Closer to the holidays, we will be gift wrapping books at all three Half Price Book stores. We will be there Black Friday along with the weekends before Christmas and on Christmas Eve. Come and say hi—it's a fun store to head to when you need to do some holiday shopping.

Thank you to all who have supported LAGR in many different ways, be it adopter, donor, volunteer or foster home—without all of you, things just would not fall into place.

Keepers Korner

I often see my family eating things that look really yummy. I think my mom is a good cook, because she and my dad scrape clean their plate when they're eating, just like I lick my food bowl clean. So, when they're eating, I try to beg (it never works) but sometimes Mom or Dad will say, "Chocolate is toxic for doggies." Toxic? What does toxic mean?

Since I am the only brainiac in our pack (Just ask me–I'll tell you), I decided to do some research in between my walks and my naps and my romps around the backyard. After all, none of my brothers or sisters are smart enough to write a column in the LAGR newsletter, right?

Once I found out what toxic meant, I figured I'd check out other things that are not good for us doggies. I think grapes look interesting to eat, but grapes—along with raisins—are bad. No way can we have them, along with wine. In fact, any kind of alcohol (beer, liquor and liqueurs) is not good for us. (So I guess I'll never get a glass of champagne to toast in the new year, but if it will help keep me healthy, I'm okay with that.)

I continued Googling to see if there were other things on the "no-no" list, and I was surprised. So many things we need to stay away from. Here is what I found out:

- onions, garlic and chives—The onion family, whether they're dry, raw or cooked, is really toxic to us canines. We can get gastrointestinal irritation, and our red blood cells can get damaged. (Besides, those things make people's breaths stink.)
- macadamia nuts
- corn on the cob (two-leggers like this stuff so much, I can't see them ever sharing it anyway, so I guess it's good that it's bad for us)
- avocado (the only green thing I like to eat is grass)
- artificial sweetener (xylitol-now that word must be a tough one to say)
- cooked bones
- potato skins and raw potatoes
- walnuts (those nuts are so funny-looking, I can't imagine they're tasty.)

And the list goes on...which made me wonder. If there are so many things on the dangerous-for-dogs list, what is on the good-for-us list? If your people want to give you some of their food, here **are** ones that are tasty and healthy:

- apples, bananas, carrots, rice, yogurt, cantaloupe
- cooked eggs, pears, pineapple, pumpkin,
- green beans (rinse them first if they're canned, since there's sometimes lots of salt in canned beans),
- sweet potatoes (cooked, with the skin removed), chicken (cooked to 180 degrees)

My mom often gripes about the deer that eat her hosta plants, so that got me thinking about plants. Are there plants–along with foods–that are bad for us doggies? As I went deeper in my research (see, I am one smart pup!), I discovered that hosta plants are not good for us, along with many others:

- tulips
- lily of the valley
- azaleas
- autumn crocus
- gladiola
- foxglove
- onion and garlic leaves of course


