Sallie Ann came to rescue on November 17, 2022. We met the breeder in Fulton, Missouri. Sallie was overweight and for

a breeder girl, she was confident. The breeder remarked she thought Sallie could be pregnant, and asked if she was, could the breeder have her back! We were very unsure why she was being surrendered if pregnant. We were just pleased to get her in the car, and we were on our way.

When she went to her vet visit, we worked on the assumption Sallie Ann was pregnant, even though at eight and a half years old, that is the last thing she needed. Luckily, we found she was not pregnant but in heat. This is a girl who knew what was expected of her when being in heat. We decided she would need a different foster home with a laid back golden for the duration of the heat.

Sallie Ann and her foster home buddy were inseparable during the first 3 weeks while Sallie was in heat. It was apparent that Sallie knew her role as a breeder and set out to complete her task. She had no luck; her new friend could not oblige.

Although Sallie Ann spent her life outside in a pen, she quickly learned the comforts of the couch and humans.

She quickly acquired her spot on the couch and at bedtime. Even though she initially was unsure of the stairs, she soon became an expert stair climber. Sallie quickly learned the routines of the home and anticipated treat times, sitting with excitement. Toys were not her thing, but all bones became only hers, and she had much joy chewing and chewing. Sallie also experienced wonderful weight loss free from her pen. She shed nearly 20 pounds. She learned that getting a brushing was a day at the spa, and all petting was pleasant.



Although she had not experienced car rides prior to her surrender, she learned that going along in the car with humans was a pleasure, and Sallie was eager to go at any time. Sallie Ann is a bird dog at heart–sniffing and eating feather ornaments off the Christmas tree. Her human would find her with a feather routinely protruding from her mouth. She could be redirected when caught, but she was also slick and quick. Thank goodness the feathers were not adhered with wire hooks. Sallie Ann was so quick to show joy and delight as if it was bottled up for so many years... and it probably was. Finally, Sallie was getting to have fun, after years and years of getting bred, having puppies, losing the puppies, and getting bred again.

She was finally able to be spayed on December 27, 2022. She did great. Initially she wore a body shirt to keep her away from stitches. It turned out that was not necessary—she did not bother them at all. The day of her spay, she went back to her original foster home. Once over her spay, she became part of the pack. She started daily walks which she loves. Sallie Ann found it's fun to chase squirrels on the fence, and she also loves rolling in the grass and leaves. When she first came, she thought the TV was an evil machine but now ignores it.

She can be a bossy girl with other dominant females but will listen well when corrected.

President's Message

Hi-

Love a Golden Rescue was 22 years old on January 9, 2023. Where has the time gone? Over the years, we have helped over 1,400 dogs—mostly goldens, golden mixes, doodles or in some cases any dog in urgent need of rescue, provided we have an available foster home. Over the years there have been so many sad stories but so many happy endings. When compiling happy endings, I am always amazed how much our adopted dogs are loved.

We are so thankful for our donors, foster homes, volunteers, our vet and our many friends in other golden rescues. Networking has been a large part of helping breeder dogs the last couple of years. There have been so many breeders closing down across the country with large amounts of dogs. Thank goodness for the internet.

In 2022, we took in 33 dogs, and many of those dogs had significant health problems. Two went to the University of Missouri for treatment, and some were treated for heartworms, cancer, hip dysplasia, to name a few. We took two special girls from China, Candy and Jessica, and they both are now in their forever homes and flourishing. Their journey was long, due to China Dog Rescue conforming to CDC regulations. Their initial flight was to Vancouver BC, where they stayed in quarantine for almost a month. They then went to LA for more quarantine time, then back to Seattle to be flown by Alaska Airlines to St. Louis. We were finally very happy to welcome them in early October. I am always amazed when it is time to finally get out of the crate, nothing fazes them, and they just move on. We have not been able to get dogs from Turkey, because currently, Chicago is not an approved CDC port of entry. The approved airports are on the east and west coast. Canada is no longer an option, because in September, they changed their rules.

We have scheduled our reunion picnic for September 23, 2022. The theme this year is "Christmas in September." It may be a little warm for Santa, but who knows. We have Trivia Night scheduled August 19, 2023, and we're hoping it does not have to be canceled again this year due to Covid-19. We will again do the Tennis Ball Challenge in April, so watch your inbox for information.

Again, thank you to everyone who has helped Love a Golden Rescue over the last 22 years become so successful that we've been able to help so many wonderful dogs.

Keeper's Korner

I am pretty easy going and not much bothers me. However, as you know, dogs cannot tell our humans what's going on using their language, so how do we communicate when we are stressed? We primarily "talk" using body language. It is important for humans to understand what we are trying to tell them. Learning your dogs' special ways of communication can reduce their anxiety and prevent potentially dangerous situations from happening. (Those are some big words I used to make up a pretty smart-sounding sentence, right? "Prevent potentially dangerous situations." I even surprised myself.) There are several warning signs to look for to help tell if your dog is stressed, and here they are:

Body Language: Stress signs to look for include whale eye (when dogs reveal the whites of their eyes), tucked ears, tucked tail, raised hackles, lip-licking, yawning, and panting. Your dog might also avoid eye contact or look away. This is most commonly seen in a dog that seems "guilty." However, the dog is actually reacting to your voice and body language and thinks something must be wrong.

Growling: This is an obvious way to tell if your dog is uncomfortable. It could mean that someone is in their space, they feel threatened, or something hurts. It is not usually meant to be aggressive but it is rather often a warning that your dog feels uncomfortable. When I give a little growl--which is hardly ever--my mom and dad know something is wrong with my world--and they try to figure out how to fix it.

Whining & Barking: Many dogs cannot control their whining when they feel stressed, as it's more of an automatic response. However, it is a clue for humans that something in the environment is causing anxiety. Barking is similar, in that pups can't always control it, but they're trying to.

Freezing in place: When your dog freezes or gets stiff, they are often stressed about something they see. In a training context, this can sometimes be seen as "submission," but modern dog training practices tell us that the dog is actually shutting down. This can be very dangerous for both you and your pup. It's a warning sign, the dog is so stressed, they can't handle the situation, and the next step may be a bite. So, when you see us become a statue, typically it's *not* a good thing.

Pacing: When canines are pacing back and forth, it's a sign they can't settle down, because something is stressing them. If this happens during mealtimes or for short periods, it might not be a big deal. Noticing when your dog engages in this behavior can give you clues as to what is triggering their anxiety.

Dog owners should also reflect on their own behavior to see how they might be contributing to the stress. Some ways owners might make their dogs stressed include not giving clear commands, staring directly at them, or punishing them unnecessarily.

The best way to calm your dog down is to identify what is stressing them, then eliminate the trigger. Alternatively, work with a professional trainer or your veterinarian to reduce their response to the trigger.

Sometimes it's as easy as blocking off an area where your dog can eat while no one bothers them, or teaching children how to respect your dog appropriately. There are times when we need some space to chill. Kids don't always recognize when we just want to be left alone for a while. If you know your dog gets stressed out about specific events, like a car ride or fireworks on the Fourth of July, there are some specific ways to ease that anxiety. Talk to your vet... I'm sure they can give you some guidance.

And now I'm going to stretch out in the yard, maybe roll around in the leaves a bit, and relax for a while...

Shiloh and Rusty are both doing great.




Shadow is doing well in his first year of adoption. I must

We've had Nash for more than a year. It's already his second season on the boat all summer.



mug and some hot chocolate--all wrapped up with a pretty bow) this past year. The coffee mug sets made for inexpensive gifts (at only \$5 each) --perfect for a neighbor or coworker. When the day ended, we only had a couple of baskets left.

Of course, it's a lot of work, but we have regular customers (custodians who work at the high school) loading up their flat-bed wagons with baskets, making many purchases before the fair officially opens. They look for our booth every year. So do other people, who come first to us and get their dog treats and baskets, before they do the rest of their shopping.
